What is the Collaborative Change Initiative?

Since 2014, the Initiative has awarded nearly \$13M to enable cross-sector collaborations in Alameda and San Francisco counties to **pilot** <u>or</u> **scale** ambitious solutions and **impact systems** to address disparities in **health**, **education** and **opportunity**.

- Provides multi-year flexible dollars and capacity building resources to crosssector collaborations at different stages
- Advances equity by investing in solutions that recognize and address racial and economic disparities
- Unites partners working together across sectors (public, private, and nonprofit) to address a complex problem, deeply rooted, and systemic
- Driven by diverse perspectives and deep community engagement so that all stakeholders enact meaningful change
- Guided by trust-based philanthropy values & practices

Approach: LAUNCH and GROWTH Grants

Five Phases of Collaboration



Generate initial agreement around a problem and goal.

Solicit participation from key partners.

Develop collaboration operating procedures and roles.

Plan for shared activities.

Design a pilot or strategy.

> Test, evaluate, and learn from pilot.

Continue to build the collaboration's membership, capacity and alignment.

LAUNCH & GROWTH Grants: Eligibility Criteria

The strongest applicants will have the following:

- Be an existing cross-sector collaboration with representatives from at least the community, nonprofit sector, AND public sector
- Member driven vs being reliant on one lead organization or person
- Meaningfully center community voices with lived experiences
- Providing direct services via a pilot or scaling solutions in San Francisco and/or Alameda County
- Have in-kind commitments and / or financial resources
- Effectively manage core collaborative functions
- LAUNCH applicants are in phase 2 (pilot solutions & build the collaborative table)
- GROWTH applicants are in phase 3 or 4 (scaling solutions citywide countywide & strengthen existing collaborative table)

LAUNCH Grants: Overview

LAUNCH Grants support early-stage, existing collaborations in <u>Alameda County</u> or San Francisco County to:

- Pilot new solutions and service models that have potential for scale
- Build internal strength of the collaboration to effectively carry out their work and to generate stakeholder support
- Funding: Up to \$165,000 per year over 3 years; \$495,000 in total
- Supports: Core operations, pilot activities, collaborative strength-building activities, and other backbone costs
- Grant period: January 2, 2025 January 2, 2028

GROWTH Grants: Overview

GROWTH Grants are intended to support *mid*stage existing collaborations in **Alameda County or San Francisco County** to:

- Begin scaling proven solutions that have the potential for broad impact
- Strengthen the collaborations, building capacity for scale and influence systems change
- Build stakeholder support from distinct sectors to reach ambitious goals
- Grant period: January 2, 2025 January 2, 2030
- Supports: Core operations, pilot activities, collaborative strengthbuilding activities, and other backbone costs
- Funding: Up to \$165,000 per year over 5 years; \$825,000 in total

- Collaborative leadership
- Sustainability
- Potential for systems change
- Launch: strength of proposed pilot
- Growth: strength of strategy, scaled solutions, and potential for systems change

Application Timeline

Invited candidates to submit a complete grant proposal (RFP)	April – June 2024
Changemaker Conversations with Community Panelists and Finalists	August – September 2024
Award Decisions	September – October 2024
Grant Agreements and Capacity Building Planning	November – December 2024
Program Period Begins	January 2025

Questions about Eligibility

What is the difference between a partner institution and a member of the collaboration?

• A partner institution is an organization from a particular sector. A member is an individual participating in the collaboration. For example, LAUNCH grant applicants should have a collaborative table with at least 4 partner institutions (organizations represented in the collaborative table) and at least 6 members (individuals from these organizations or the community who are actively involved
